**Referral Process and Pathways:** 

The 1st Steps to Childcare course is to upskill and train parents to a level where they are work ready and have the appropriate skill set, knowledge and a work-based qualification which will allow them the opportunity to apply for either a Support Practitioner/Support Worker/Nursery Assistant, or a Child Development Officer (CDO) position within an Early Learning and Childcare (ELC) setting.

Candidates are recruited via ELC and partnership settings, with referrals made by Head Teachers and Management Team. Referrals are all linked in with Glasgow Life Family Finances Key Workers (FFKW).

Training starts with a 6-month introductory course at college, with a day a week volunteering placement in an ELC/Partnership nursery, followed by a year- long course with a Training Provider to gain SVQ Level 2 Social Services (Children and Young People). If the candidate wishes to progress further, they can then study for a further year to gain SVQ Level 3 Social Services (Children and Young People).

The YPSB support young parents still attending school, from pregnancy through to the early years of their child's life. They offer ongoing communication to help the young parents adapt to their new circumstances in school.

If it is identified during any of the planning and reviewing processes that the young person is struggling to maintain education, YPSB and the registered school deploys a specialist teacher, who supports the young parent with their education within the YPSB base or another identified location. This flexible and targeted resource allows the young person to continue with their education and adapt to their new circumstances.

In addition to this, there is also a specialist Creative Family Links worker who offers a therapeutic service to the most vulnerable young parents at the Base, providing additional support for the families' mental health and well-being, as well as supporting them to access educational/ work opportunities.

Young parents are supported to adjust to their new role as a parent and signposted to relevant agencies to deal with finance, housing and health.

Summary	

The ChoiceWorks Programme sits within Glasgow City Council's, Neighbourhoods, Regeneration and Sustainability business area. It is an Employability Programme that supports individuals aged 16+, resident in Glasgow who have a history of offending and are not in employment, education or training.

It has three teams which cover the North West, North East and South of the city. Each team has two Intervention Workers and a Case Management Worker, all teams are supported by two Training and Employability officers. The Programme will accept a referral from any source, including that of self-referral.

By working with participants, it seeks to change the behaviour by providing appropriate and proportionate bespoke intervention sessions to make the transition not only into that of employment, education or training, but also to assist to address and support other issues in their life which may be viewed as an obstacle to a positive outcome.

Glasgow Supported Employment Service (GSES) supports people with learning disabilities and / or autistic spectrum conditions to get and keep a job. We do this in several ways all of which use the supported employment model.

- an all-age supported employment service that is delivered by the team of job coaches on a 1:1 basis.
- Project Search which is a fulltime work experience programme based within a large employer. During the year participants undertake three, ten-week work rotations in different areas of the business learning new skills. Full time specialist staff are there to support participants.
- Improving the journey to a modern apprenticeship where participants will undertake supported work experience within a Glasgow City Council department to improve their skills and knowledge. Participants will be supported to apply for a modern apprenticeship and receive in work support if successful

Staff in the service are happy to talk to both potential participants and referrers about any aspect of the service.

The Launchpad Training Programme is a 26-week programme targeted at young care leavers (aged 16-25) based within G.C.C. Social Work.

- 26-week employability programme.
- Training Allowance for attendance.
- Intensive, tailored levels of support.
- Individual action planning to develop positive workplace behaviours.
- Sourcing work experience placements to showcase relevant experience.
- Progression on successful completion of programme into Employment, Training or Further Education.

Each trainee contracted for 30hrs a week on the programme with the majority of hours spent on a work placement. Work experience is a critical aspect of the service and aims to offer care leavers a meaningful work placement. Launchpad staff offer wrap around support to the trainee whilst on the programme to ensure sustainability. The Launchpad programme has developed into the most successful route whereby care leavers progress onto employment via the Glasgow Guarantee and Community Jobs Scotland.

The project is a partnership with Bridges Programmes, the Community Renewal Trust and Glasgow Clyde College. Summary			

Delivered by Glasgow Supported Employment Service, this supported work experience programme aims to help young people with autistic spectrum conditions who are almost ready to begin employment but need some extra support and training before getting there. It will allow young people the opportunity to gain valuable work experience and develop the skills and confidence they need to get an apprenticeship and keep it.

Participants will be placed into a work placement within Glasgow City Council for between 18 - 30 weeks and will be supported by a dedicated job coach who will help them learn new tasks, settle into the workplace, introduce them to a workplace buddy, and support them to apply for a Modern Apprenticeship with Glasgow City Council.

Participants will be job matched to the most suitable work placement, based on their skills, qualities, experience and interests.

Participants will also be supported with job searching including CV building, writing applications and help to prepare for interview.

Glasgow Alcohol and Addictions Services (GADRS) has linked with Health and Social Care Partnership (HSCP) Young Persons Teams working with young people aged 16-24. - •Young Person's Recovery Coach will provide diversionary work and to promote recovery for young people where drugs and alcohol have been a risk for them and where additional prevention measures can be put in place to prevent them from being influenced, and
- •Young Person's Employment Advisor to promote pathways to positive destinations.

Digital skills can help young people secure a well-paid career with long-term security; however, training is often costly. The Glasgow Code Learning (GCL) programme provides an accelerated route for those who wish to gain entry-level employment in the Digital Technologies sector, by offering opportunities to build expertise or reskill and transition into alternative employment. GCL uses an incremental progression model to build skills and experience over three levels of accredited digital skills courses.

Designed to suit the young person's existing skills and aspirations, levels range from the very basics required for work, to top level digital skills courses in Web Design, Cyber Security and Software Development, for example. GCL is delivered in partnership with Glasgow Clyde College. All courses are delivered flexibly as a blend of face to face and online provision so that participants can fit their studies around their other commitments.

GCL participants benefit from a community of supportive tutors, access to laptops, software and connectivity, 1-1 support sessions and guidance on starting a career in the Digital Technologies sector. Those enrolling for intermediate and top level GCL courses, also receive a Clyde College student card and have access to the facilities at all three of Clyde College's campuses.

The Glasgow Guarantee is a highly regarded employment programme, that offers Glasgow residents access to a variety of Modern Apprenticeships and Living Wage jobs.

To register, candidates must live in Glasgow and be either:

- Unemployed and referred by one of Glasgow Guarantee's approved Employability Providers;
- School leavers who attend either a Glasgow school or live in Glasgow and attend a non-Glasgow school;
- College leavers studying SCQF Level 6 or below;
- Facing redundancy and supported by PACE Candidates will have access to their own individual account to access and apply for suitable vacancies.

Candidates who are on a work placement with a Glasgow employer (which is organised by a Glasgow Guarantee approved Employability Provider), can have that placement converted to a job. The candidate and employer need to be eligible and register with Glasgow Guarantee.

Candidates who secure employment will receive In Work Support and have access to a Progression Award (up to £1,000) to undertake training, within the first 12 months of employment.

The Glasgow Sport Training Academy Pilot Programme will be delivered over a 12-week period, and has been designed to give candidates the skills, knowledge and experiences required for employment within the Sport and Leisure Sector.

The programme outcomes will be specifically targeted to the role profile of a Glasgow Life Assistant (Lifeguard). The programme and involves candidates completing a series of employability and personal development units delivered by Glasgow Sports Development Team. A blended approach will be taken to learning, with 40% of the time spend in a training environment, and 60 percent completing a work placement in a supported environment in one of our sport and leisure facilities.

Candidates are supported through the completion of a 190 hour work placement within our leisure facilities. Candidates receive 1-2-1 mentoring and support throughout their experience. Training will be delivered by an experienced tutor team, and each candidate will be supported with an individual training plan. Candidates will be allocated an assessor who will provide tailored mentoring and support throughout the duration.
